## Patterned Egg K-5

Objective: Students will create colorful patterned egg drawings.

## Topics \& Keywords for Discussion:

Easter: a spring holiday celebrated by people of the Christian
 faith. There are many popular traditions around the Easter holiday that are representative of a general festival of springtime: candies, eggs, and bunny rabbits are also symbols associated with Easter, alongside pastel colors of pink, yellow, green, blue and purple.

Materials: construction paper, colored pencils, oil pastels, markers, ruler, pencils, scissors, foam stickers.

Opening activity: What is INSIDE the egg? Prepare an EGG SURPRISE guessing game, and collect ALL THE STUDENT ANSWERS before you REVEAL the answer. You can prepare this in a lot of different ways: depending on the resources you have at your disposal. Spring is a fun season that can be celebrated with scavenger hunts and other games. In fact, you and your students may want to re-distribute your ART as a decoration throughout your club.

Core Activity: Distribute watercolor paper and pencils. Instruct students to draw a BIG oval on their paper. Let them know it does NOT HAVE TO BE PERFECT! Then, have students use a ruler to divide up their egg, drawing lines to create sections on their egg's surface. Distribute the oil pastels, markers and colored pencils. They are going to draw different patterns and colors in each 'slice' of the egg with oil pastels, creating a colorful patterned egg! Invite students to pass their eggs around to other students at the table for their friends to fill in a segment before passing it back- they can trade artwork back and forth to create collaborative pieces.

Once their patterned egg is complete, distribute SCISSORS for students to cut out their egg. If you want, you can hide these egg art pieces around the club for a fun spring time egg hunt!

Reflection: As students help to clean up the space, ask them about Spring Holiday traditions in their families.
